Horizon Through the Eyes of a Camper

In the summer of 1990, I was graduating college and decided to spend the summer in Champaign, IL. This meant I would miss MDA summer camp but I didn't worry because I knew I could always go the next summer. When I returned home, I was informed that MDA was making some budget cuts and set an age limit for adults to attend their summer camp. This news was very disappointing because I was too old and missing the previous year, I had lost contact with many of my camp friends. Luckily I found out about a group of individuals that was going to continue this summer camp program for adults with physical disabilities. As soon as I heard this news, I asked for an application so I could be part of this new experience. To this day, that was one of my best decisions I've made. In the summer of '91, I was at the very first Association of Horizon, Inc. summer camp program. I was impressed at how well

these devoted volunteers worked to put together a camp without much time or a lot of funding. This camp was smaller than I was used to but many things were similar. Horizon had many volunteers that went to the other camp and also did a wonderful job recruiting new ones. Many of the activities were kept intact such as: arts and crafts, waterfront and swimming just to name a few. One of the nicest changes was that for the first time, you could go to any activity you wanted to or just hang out instead, the choice was yours. Another significant difference was everyone was treated equally, there were no differences between "volunteers" & "campers". This was a big step for me. Yes, I knew I was in a wheelchair but for this one week out of the year it didn't matter. I admit, my first year I solely went as a "camper" and looked at it as a free week of vacation. However, during the week I learned how hard so many people worked to make

that week happen and it gave me a new look on things. Horizon may not have offered as many activities as the other camp did but I found out it wasn't the activities that made camp great, it was all of the people. Due to many of these people, becoming more involved with Horizon was something I felt I needed to do. There was so much work to be done to ensure a second year of camp. I became an active member in the organization by helping with fund-raising, attending events throughout the year and I even served on the Board of Directors. The more I helped, the more I learned how much this organization means to so many. Now this summer, I will be attending my 20th year of Camp Horizon and I'm amazed at how far the organization has come. In 1991, there may have been a total of 75 participants, this year we are anticipating over 200! Each year, camp has grown and become better.

Horizon is Celebrating 20 Years of Camping!




Beads Were Flying at the Mardi Gras Bash!
